

Life is like a warm cup of coffee that we never really had together and probably never will. Yet, it seems as if endless cups have passed between us even though none really have.



Basbousa Sweet Chef Karim

Preparation time: 35 mins Serves: 10

Ingredients:

3 cups Semolina Powder 2 cups Condensed Milk 1.3 cup Water

100gms Almonds 100gms Sugar

Instructions:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 220°C
- 2. Blend semolina powder in the mixer for 5 minutes at the speed of 3.
- 3. Add condensed milk as well as water into the mixer and blend for 5 7 minutes. If the mixture seems too thick, add a little water. Make sure to maintain a fairly stiff consistency.

- 4. Spread the mixture into a buttered baking tray
- 5. Place almonds onto the mixture in a pattern of your choice
- 6. Bake for 35 40 minutes or until golden brown at 220°C
- 7. Let it cool for 1 hour
- 8. Top it with sugar syrup

A rumor or a terrifying truth? Brace yourself as a student shares experiences with the paranormal...



Discover the incredible journey of Ebrahim Ehab, a Grade 9 student, who was awarded 2nd place at the First Korean Ambassador Cup Taekwondu Championship held at Bahrain National Stadium.

Since I began to take my training and potential career as a taekwondo player seriously, I have realized that with persistent hard work and dedication, I could find myself at a platform, where I am able to encourage people who are losing dedication and faith in themselves.

I have been there, trust me! For a while I just wanted to give up because I thought that I would never achieve what I have achieved today. And, perhaps, I won't believe what I will become eventually, if I don't give up.

This began with my training a year ago. Sunday, Tuesday and Thursday. Three times a week. It was slow, my progression was very slow because I did not take taekwondo seriously. I was there to have a little bit of fun, that's all.

In October, I was told that there would be a huge competition for tackwondo. I thought I might just sign up. I had nothing to lose. My captain, S. Hussain, however, who has the 5th black belt, and captain Ebrahim, who has 4th black belt, had other plans for me. They said that they saw me in high places.

For two months, I underwent rigorous training. Practicing for long hours every day. I wasn't really anxious or frightened until, perhaps, the final week before the tournament. I started to get just a bit nervous then.

On the day of the tournament, I woke up fresh and ready to face the challenge head on. We drove to Isa Town Stadium. I was hyped, energetic and determined.

30 minutes till I fight, with my first opponent. I was ready, wearing my armor. They called my name, I got down from the seating area to enter the arena. I was informed that I had won by default. My opponent had retreated.

I got back up and took off my gear. I felt calm, ready and quiet.

Captain Ebrahim informed me when it was time for the final fight. He said, I had already received a silver medal. But that wasn't what I was aiming for, I wanted Gold!

I got in the arena and the fight began. My opponent would hit, I would hit back. At the final 5 secs of the first round, he hit my head. Score was 5 - 15. I was very disappointed with myself. Captain Hussain told me to remain focused and to protect my head at all costs.

The bell goes off. The second round commences. I felt energetic. I don't even know where I got that kind of energy from. I started playing very well but I couldn't get a single point. Two minutes. The round ends.

Now it's a deathmatch. This was it, I thought. I had to get up and fight with everything I had or I would lose the gold medal. Last round starts. I was motivated with anger. I was playing very aggressively. The score was 19 - 27. I was making a big comeback but he stopped me with a hit below the belt.

I fell on the ground in pain, the referee stopped the match. The medic rushed towards me. He advised me to not finish the match. There were 45 seconds left. I hadn't come all this way to give up last minute.

In pain, I moved like a punching bag. The match ended 19 - 31. I went up to my team. All of their faces long. They seemed more upset than I was that my hits were not counted. I told them it was fine. This was my first big tournament. I had been playing for 4 - 5 months and I got silver medal.

I have been practicing for a year now; and I think I can say I have improved in many ways. I can say from my own experience that hardwork and dedication definitely pays off.
